It was a joy to visit many of you along the way, and a special joy to again volunteer at the Reformed Church's mission in Kentucky, to spend time with family and friends and to enjoy five weeks in Michigan - first in

Wendell celebrated his 85th birthday on November 16, the same day on which long-time friend and missionary colleague, Jack Hill, was born in a log cabin in Michigan's upper peninsula 15 years earlier. Since his wife, Joann, had died last year, Jack went to live with his daughter in Atlanta. We celebrated both birthdays by making a weekend trip there to participate in Jack's 100th birthday celebration where he was still able to give an inspiring talk about lessons he had learned during each decade of his life.

As for our children and grandchildren, there were a number of significant developments during the year. Steve, Pelesia



First, a 2nd edition of his memoirs (The Church Under the Cross: Mission in Asia in Times of Turmoil). This four-volume set will replace his original two volumes recounting his experiences in Taiwan, Hong Kong, China and Indonesia, with each country covered in a separate volume that adds ten more years to the story, along with more photos. The first volume on Taiwan: The Cross of Fascism will be published by the end of the year. His second project is a book featuring extracts from Joyce's thousand pages of letters written from Taiwan and Hong Kong entitled Joyce's
